Report from the Chairperson and the Executive Director

Community Action Resource Centre is proud of its growing impact on our community. We have had another amazing year and was the strong support we have from our volunteers and staff, funders and friends that made it all possible.

This past year showed amazingly strong support coming from the provincial government. Responding to the federal government's unexpected withdrawal of \$54m in CIC settlement funding (\$18m in Toronto alone), the Ontario Government implemented a Sustainability Fund that provided financial support to the most severely impacted settlement agencies. We were proud to host Ontario Minister of Citizenship & Immigration, the Hon. Dr Eric Hoskins, at 1652 Keele Street in February to make the public announcement of the new Sustainability Fund. In addition to the Ministry's financial support, MCI, United Way Toronto and OCASI joined forces to bring a series of workshops and consulting supports to affected Toronto-area agencies. We very much appreciate the supports provided and the Province's vision in ensuring a strong settlement sector in Ontario, particularly in Toronto, home of choice for so many newcomers from every corner of the world. Because of this, our settlement program remains vibrant and relevant, and we can look forward from a place of strength.

The 1652 Keele Street lobby renovation that we announced last year, funded by The Ontario Trillium Foundation, was delayed due to circumstances beyond our control, but it is now back on track and about to 'break ground'. As well as the space renovation, this project includes a program of community engagement that will facilitate us reaching into new communities and engaging residents around new programming that will grow from their own identified interests.

In the year to come we will also continue our work to establish a cross cultural women & girls' space in our community. This is something that is so needed to support the many women from different cultural and linguistic backgrounds who have told us that such a space would provide them with a focal point in their community, allowing them to come together at times that meet their needs, to receive culturally appropriate support in the languages they speak, to reduce their isolation, and to help them be actively engaged in their city.

This year we took on a more active role in the Emmett Avenue Community Garden. Through the efforts of Evergreen, the garden was established in 2006 in Eglinton Flats, with the cross cultural women's program helping in the space search and since then has been an active participant every year. Now Evergreen has passed the torch to us to support the community in managing their garden within the beautiful Eglinton Flats park. With all the unending rain this past Spring, and with the garden located in a low-lying flood area close to the Humber River, we definitely took over at a challenging time!

During the year we also supported three new community kitchens at different locations in the community. One was in partnership with York Hispanic Centre for the Spanish speaking community, another one focused on the Somali community in a local apartment building, and another one was in Martha Eaton Way, the building where we operate our Children's Program. All of these unique kitchens meet the differing needs of their respective participants, and all contribute to community building, reducing isolation, and food security.

Another new project this past year was a Community Safety Project, that will see safety ambassadors trained to work within designated neighbourhoods, as well as a permanent "community safety corner" where local residents can connect around issues of safety that affect their neighbourhoods. Community safety is not just the role of law enforcement, it is the responsibility of the whole community, and this project will facilitate neighbourhood involvement.

As well as these new initiatives that are so exciting to work on, the core services of our organization continue in the background as always, providing supports to some of the most vulnerable members of our community. Staff are available on a walk-in basis daily, helping people in crisis, providing needed items from our donations room, registering people without telephones for our voice mail program, helping young families find childcare or needed supports and services, filling out forms, providing income tax clinics for low income individuals and families, sharing donations and toys in the Christmas Holidays season, helping people to acess the internet, and on and on. This is rewarding work that makes a real difference in people's day to day lives, and we appreciate the hard work of our staff and volunteers who make this happen.

This past year was amazingly challenging, productive, and interesting. We are so fortunate to work within a community that is so resourceful and resilient, so talented and so willing to contribute. We feel inspired by the CARC family, friends and other partners who contribute to making Toronto such a great place to live and work.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT: Child Care Registry

The Child Care Registry assists parents to locate suitable care for their children. The program also included information, referral, support and resources for care providers and seekers, including a bimonthly newsletter "Kids 'N Care". The Registry provided referrals to other forms of child care including licensed child care centres and licensed home child care options.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT:

Satellite to Ontario Early Years - Davenport Riding

As a satellite site of the Davenport Ontario Early Years (OEYC) program, we support families and caregivers of children 0-6 years of age, providing information, referral, orientation, guidance and translation regarding programs and services offered at Davenport OEYC, as well as providing workshops on topics of interest to those caring for young children.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT: Emmett Avenue Community Garden

Emmett Avenue Community Garden was initiated by Evergreen in 2006. We have been an active member of the garden since its inception, including the original search for suitable space. This year we took on the role of supporting our community in managing their garden as Evergreen passed the torch. So far it has definitely been an interesting year. We have battled flooded plots with swimming ducks, shoulder high weeds when the rain finally subsided, a family of deer who are now probably the best-fed deer in Toronto, and numerous park visitors who also became well fed at our expense! We are meeting with City Parks staff to try and resolve these and other issues, so with their support we will continue to work with the gardening co-ordinating committee to reach our goal of making the Emmett Avenue Community Garden the best community garden in all of Toronto!

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT: Community Kitchens

Since 2009 we have been a member of a Community Kitchens Collective, a Healthy Communities initiative lead by Unison Community Health Centre, with additional supports provided by George Brown College including program funds and training.

Our role in the collective was to support the community in initiating new community kitchens, and we developed three in the neighbourhoods we work in -one in collaboration with York Hispanic Centre serving the Spanish speaking community; the second in a local apartment building for the Somali speaking community; and the third in another local apartment building where our Children's Program operates.

These programs foster a sense of community, reduce isolation, promote healthy eating and food security. The participants choose what to cook and therefore the food meets their cultural needs and preferences, and they participate in workshops that educate around issues of healthy lifestyle choices which therefore leads to improved long term health outcomes.

Emmett Avenue Community Garden

Children

Summer 2011 got off to a great start, nearly 40 children registered for the first few sessions. Thankfully Camp Team Leader Latoya Gray returned for a third year! Day trips are scheduled to places of interest both in and out of Toronto, the first trip being to the amazing Riverdale Farm. Check out the CARC Facebook page by the end of August, which should be filled with awesome memories of an amazing summer. Thank you to all the hardworking Camp Counsellors, youth mentors and volunteers for giving our kids another great summer to remember.

As well as the Summer Camp, we also provide an afterschool program for 7-12 year olds in the same community. A variety of indoor and outdoor activities promote good health and positive interactions between the children.











Newcomers

In the past year, our settlement services program provided culturally and linguistically appropriate services to newcomers in various languages - Cantonese, Dari, English, Farsi, Hindi, Italian, Mandarin, Pashto, Somali, Spanish, Urdu, and Vietnamese. Due to the unexpected and sudden withdrawal of federal CIC settlement funding to many agencies at the end of March, we lost the capacity to serve many of these newcomer communities. This had a particular impact on the Cantonese and Mandarin speaking communities, since there are no other settlement services in these languages in our community. A growing Vietnamese speaking client base was able to be referred to other settlement agencies on St Clair and on Sheppard Avenue, and we were able to absorb Spanish speaking clients thanks to recently increased resources from the Ontario Ministry of Citizenship & Immigration, although we will need to closely monitor our staff's increased workload. Nonetheless, a very busy year saw continued increase in one-on-one client services, as well as a wider variety of group programs.

- Even with the need to wind down ISAP services in the period between January and March 2011, we still coordinated and delivered 133 workshops and groups for ISAP or NSP eligible newcomers in 2010-11, attended by over 2,000 participants. These sessions provided information relating to immigration, citizenship, finance, education, family violence, health and wellness, employment, housing, legal, and taxation, as well as weekly group activities designed to reduce isolation and foster civic engagement
- We continued to be an active member of the York South-Weston Local Immigration Partnership Council, lead by Social Planning Toronto, as well as participating on each of the Work Groups. As well, we participated in the West Downtown Toronto LIP, lead by \$t Stephen's House, being a member of the Bloor-Junction Council, whose boundaries cover the area served by our Davenport site.
- We collaborated with a variety of community partners throughout the year, including benefiting from the amazing resources provided by Unison Community Health Centre, in a partnership providing weekly sessions to Somali speaking women focusing on health and disease prevention.
- We collaborated with York Hispanic Centre in the delivery of settlement services to the Spanish speaking community, including starting a new weekly community kitchen program that helps reduce isolation, provides the opportunity to prepare and eat healthy foods with friends old and new, and to learn about daily choices that promote good health while helping to reduce lifestyle diseases such as diabetes, stroke and heart disease
